	<p>Y1 Relationships Piece 4 – People who help us If children find something unsuitable on a computer, or see/hear something that they feel uncomfortable about, practise with them who they can ask for help and what they can say.</p> <p>KS1 Jigsaw Relationships Being safe online Children learn to identify ways that some people might behave differently online and who to ask for help if they are worried; they also learn to recognise that not everything that is online is true, including who people say they are.</p> <p>KS1 Jigsaw Healthy Me Learning about the internet Children learn to identify ways that the internet can be used safely to find things out and communicate in everyday life, whilst also recognising that not everything that is online is true.</p> <p>Year 6 Jigsaw Relationships Pieces 2-6 (Online safety lessons) In these lessons on staying safe when using technology, children learn to recognise and resist pressure to use technology in ways that</p>	<p>Year 1 Jigsaw Celebrating Difference Pieces 3 & 4 Children learn about what bullying is and how it might feel to be bullied; they also identify who they can talk to if they are unhappy or being bullied and can identify that bullying is sometimes about difference allows children to understand more and to decide not to bully. Children are empowered to know what is right and wrong and to look after themselves. This whole Puzzle reinforces the messages about tolerance, difference and similarity, and how to be a better friend, and how to deal with bullying if it arises.</p> <p>Year 6 Jigsaw Relationships Pieces 5 & 6 (Online safety lessons) Children learn to use technology positively and safely to communicate with friends and family, whilst taking responsibility for their own safety and well-being.
