



The children were dressed beautifully as their chosen character and proudly acted




















This week in maths we have been learning about 2D and 3D shapes and sorting them according to their properties. We also made patterns with the 3D shapes with our partners.




























The food...

Autistic people often struggle with food due to sensory differences or anxiety. We are not being fussy or picky eatersthese are real issues. Ensure you have food you are comfortable with. Yes, we absolutely have chicken nuggets available for Christmas dinner! Do what works for you.





Overwhelmed!

All the Christmas lights, decorations, visitors, events, music, different foods and smells... it can be totally overwhelmina!

If you need minimal decorations in your house then do that! If you are visiting people, ask for them to create a quiet safe space where you can regulate. Don't feel you have to join in with everything. Do what works for you and your family.



The presents...

There are so many things to think about here. As an autistic person worried about whether my face was portraying the right emotion, I hate having people watch me opening presents! Don't demand that you see children open their presents. Sometimes too many presents at once can be overwhelming and you might want to stagger them throughout the day. For others the

wait is more anxiety inducing and they need to open them.



Christmas events!

It can be overwhelming to go to noisy events with lots of people. Christmas tree light ups, family events, visits to Father Christmas...

we might need adaptions. Consider a safe place at home or family's where you can regulate. Consider ear

defenders when out and about. Don't push children to see Father Christmas if they don't want to... they don't know him! And definitely consider a calendar with events on so that everyone knows what is happening and when. And don't feel you have to do everything!




Along with the other demands of Christmas events is the socialising. It can be lovely to see people, don't get me wrong, but it can be exhausting, especially for those of us who find conversation challenging. A quiet space can help and knowing when you will be leaving...it can help to have a time to

There's an element of surprise... many autistic people struggle with surprises. Me included!! My children couldn't cope with wrapped presents, so one year I used cellophane so that they could see! It definitely reduced anxiety but we weren't there yet... with fine motor difficulties we discovered gift bags were the best option.

Agreeing what presents people will get you with a list might work too. Again, do what works for you!
